# **Something to Think About:**

The Gospel writers tell us that Jesus was crucified between two other men. While the writers describe them using different terms (rebels, criminals, outlaws), what we do know is that they will forever be known as "thieves". What were their names? Were they married?



Did they have kids? I wonder what their hobbies were? What made them laugh? We will never know the answer to these questions. They will forever be known as "thieves" due to, what was likely, one very bad choice they made along the way. And yet, Jesus offers grace. Is that fair? No, it's not. That's why it's called "grace". Grace isn't supposed to be fair.



**Study Guide:** Think of someone you know or even an historical figure whose life has been defined by one poor choice? Do you think that's fair? Why or why not?

What do you think of so-called "death bed confessions"...the notion that a person can live any way he/she wants and still receive grace and salvation in their last breath? Does it work that way, and is that fair? Why or why not?

In Luke 23:35-39, you'll notice how various people treated Jesus as he hung on the cross. Notice the first part of verse 35. What does this say about people? Where has this happened in your life?

Read and reflect on verse 42. Where do you think the thief came up with this idea?

Is there something in your life that needs Jesus' forgiveness? If so, ask him now.




Lenten Reflection
